These young boys and girls worked hard to make sure customers got their dailynews on the front porch where it was safe from the

weather and the neighbor's dog! It wasn't easy; papers had to be delivered in all types of weather – even when it snowed 24 inches overnight!

Many newsies did paper routes to help with family expenses and to save money to attend college. For most a paper route was a family tradition, with routes being passed down to younger siblings and parents helping to fold the papers before breakfast.

And the money wasn't the only thing these kids got out of being a newsie. The dedication, leadership, and people skills newsies learned helped many of them grow up to become doctors, lawyers, merchants, and even work with United States Senators!

This film will be shown on March 20 at 7 p.m.



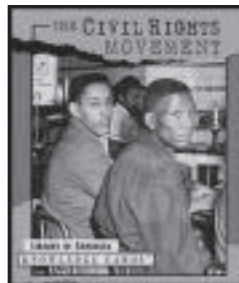
